As a school division, we are focusing on improvements in the following areas:

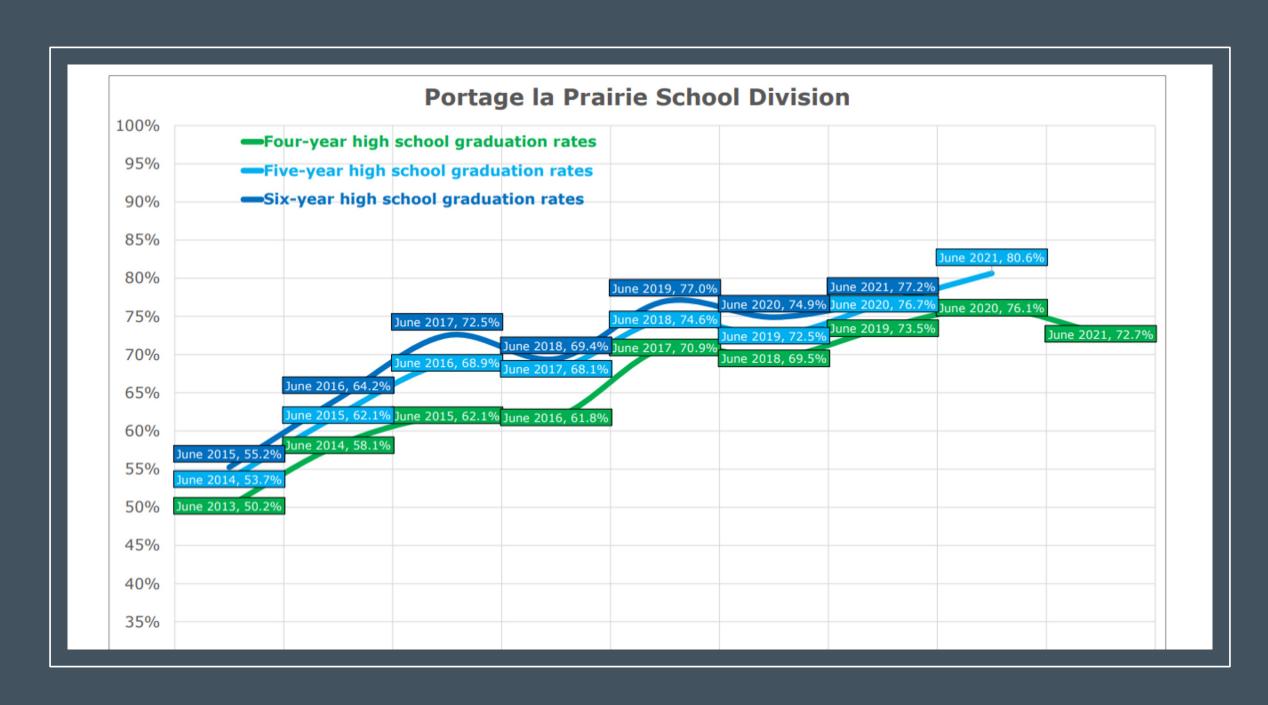

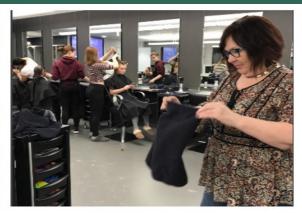

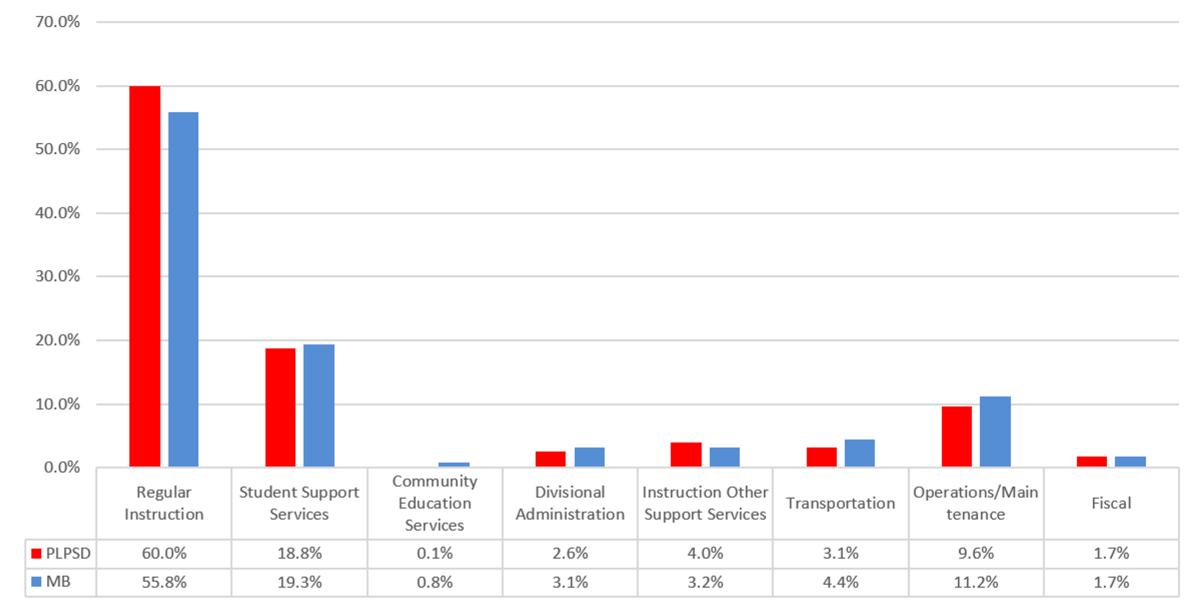

Cost Per Pupil Comparison FRAME Budgeted 22-23

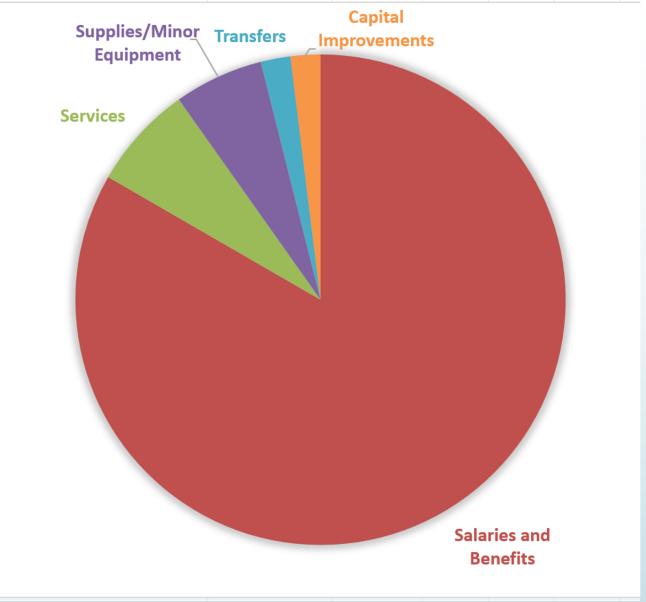

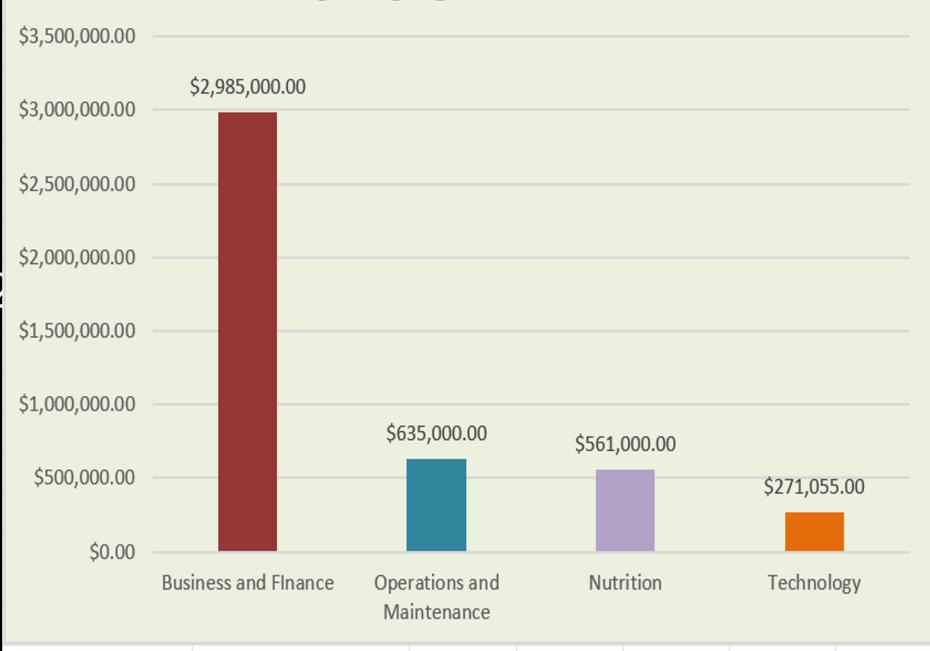
2024-2025 Budgeted Expenditures

Proposing an 3.8% increase to the Mill Rate

In order for the PLPSD to meet the needs of our students and community, we are proposing a modest inflationary increase to local ratepayers. For the educational property levy the estimated increase for the ratepayer will be:

- Home valued at \$250,000 is approximately an increase of \$51
- A Farm valued at \$1,000,000 is approximately an increase of \$117

The province has stated that the 50% educational property tax rebate will continue for ratepayers this fiscal year.

The Board is continuing to review the budget and the mill rate.
